

In Bangalore, nearly one million people live in slums, and about one-third of slum dwellers fall below the poverty line. Most of the children living in these slums are firstgeneration learners.





OUR PROGRAMS

NUMERACY AND LITERACY PROGRAMS EDUCATION

Our senior students stepped up as educators, dedicating three days each week to teach elementary children fundamental Math and English skills. Enthusiastic volunteers further enriched the educational experience by delivering valuable knowledge through Science and Math classes for all our children. Routine assessments in numeracy and literacy enabled us to track their development and tailor their educational journeys. The unwavering dedication of our volunteer teachers ensured ongoing support, offering valuable feedback on the children's progress and addressing their challenges.





SCIENCE PROJECT AT ACT EDUCATION

In memory of our beloved trustee, the late Radhika Arvindam, ACT joined forces with the Agastya International Foundation to launch a groundbreaking Science Project on July 1, 2022. This project aims to revolutionize science education, emphasizing experiential learning. Children learn various topics such as fundamental microscopic equipment, thermometers, chemical reactions, and optics, fostering creativity and self-confidence.

DREAMKIT PROGRAM EDUCATION



Our collaboration with Dream Kit led to the Dream Kit Creators Camp, a two-day innovation extravaganza for students in grades 5 to 12. This camp covered circuitry, robotics, and coding using Blockly app. Three camps were held, featuring activities like redesigning everyday objects and culminating in project showcases, certificate distribution, and exhibitions for parents.

TURNING PAGE PROGRAM EDUCATION

Collaborating with the Turning Pages community, we introduced a reading program to enhance children's literacy and social-emotional skills. Sessions included icebreakers, story readings, vocabulary games, and quizzes. The program catered to various age groups, fostering a love for learning and helping children develop essential reading and comprehension skills.





PROTEIN MIX: NOURISHING FAMILIES HEALTH

As part of our ongoing efforts to support the well-being of our families, we provide a monthly supply of protein mix. This blend is cooked with love and prepared by the

dedicated mothers of ACT. Their meticulous process involves precise measurements, thorough cleaning, sifting, roasting, pounding, and packaging of this protein mix. To further align with ACT's commitment to environmental sustainability, the protein mix is first sealed in brown paper bags before being placed in eco-friendly cloth bags.

JOURNEY THROUGH ART LIFE SKILLS

MAP implemented the "Journey through Art" program, a year-long multi-intervention initiative designed to instill life skills through the arts, encompassing creative thinking, critical thinking, and communication. 26 students actively participated in various activities such as quizzes, fun games, and creative tasks like visualizing and drawing superheroes. In addition, the students also brainstormed innovative strategies to protect villages from floods during the rainy season, fostering their problem-solving skills and creativity.





MENTAL HEALTH AND COUNSELING LIFE SKILLS

Our counseling initiative significantly bolsters selfesteem, confidence, and social skills, aiding children in navigating their lives. From April to September 2022, ACT partnered with The Listeners' Collective to introduce Project Catalyst, specifically targeting the hurdles adolescents face. From January to March 2023, three dedicated counselors have supported this endeavor. 19 children were identified from the group to attend individual therapy sessions. Students from grades 5 and 6 participated in an emotional management workshop, promoting selfawareness, empathy, and handling emotions through engaging activities.

PRODUCIVITY AND COMMUNICATION LIFE SKILLS

Our children participated in sessions focusing on time management and effective communication. They acquired valuable skills related to creating and maintaining daily schedules. Additionally, our children learnt about the essential aspects of body language, respectful conversation, and the importance of active listening. These sessions provided them with valuable life skills to enhance their personal and interpersonal development.





22ND ACT ANNUAL DAY COMMUNITY

Our Annual day conducted on January 8th, was a mega success! The theme of the Annual Day was, 'A tribute to

Lata Mangeshkar', chosen to honour the Nightingale of India. The ACT children gave mesmerizing dance and singing performances, showcased their martial arts skills, and also put on a play.

MOTHERS MEETING COMMUNITY

The valuable insights shared by the mothers highlighted their challenges, particularly food insecurity. Their positive feedback on how ACT interventions effectively addressed these concerns was heartening. Testimonials celebrating children securing prominent positions, including one child working in a bank, brought immense pride and gratitude. Discussions on financial inclusion led to encouraging mothers to open bank accounts and save for their children's future.





DISTRIBUTION DRIVE COMMUNITY

We provided blankets to 277 children as part of our mission to offer warmth and comfort to those in challenging situations. These blankets were distributed to families within ACT who were facing harsh weather conditions and economic difficulties. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, dedicated volunteers, and our committed team, we distributed a significant number of blankets. This initiative showcases our unwavering dedication to making a positive impact on the community and emphasizes our ongoing commitment at ACT.

MOTHERS DAY OUT RECREATION

A group of 73 mothers embarked on a two-day trip filled with adventure. They visited the awe-inspiring Gaganchukki and Barachukki falls at Shivanasamudra, enjoyed fun moments on the banks of the Cauvery River, and saw the grandeur of St. Philomena's Cathedral on the first day. Day two took them to the sacred Chamundeshwari temple and the Mysore Zoo. The mothers expressed their utmost happiness and satisfaction with the trip, creating beautiful memories that they will cherish.





TRIPS AND ADVENTURES RECREATION

ACT's students enjoyed enriching trips this year. The senior girls embarked on a captivating 2-day excursion to Mysore, taking in coracle rides, scenic river confluences, lush waterfalls, and the grandeur of Mysore Palace. Meanwhile, the senior boys explored Sakleshpur and Hassan, where they delved into historical sites like Manjarabad fort and sacred temples, all while having fun at their favorite picnic spot, Balmuri Falls. Other classes ventured on engaging day trips to Vishweshariah Museum, the Nehru Planetarium and Bannerghatta National Park, making learning both fun and educational.






Class-wise Distribution of Children






Age-wise Distribution of Children










Individual Contributions to Total Donations (Rs)









Contributions from individual donors amounted to Rs 40 lakh in 2022-23, representing a 52% increase over the prior year.

Total income in FY 2022-23 was Rs 1.16 crore, including Rs 1.1 crore in total donations (95% total income).


EXPENSE BREAKDOWN





INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

1. REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of ASHWINI CHARITABLE TRUST, No. 3, St. John's Road Cross, (Near Ulsoor Lake) Ulsoor, Bangalore - 560042 (the Trust), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31,2023, the Statement of Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account (hereinafter referred to as Financial Statements) for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS:

An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of the accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the financial statements.




5. REPORT ON OTHER LEGAL AND REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS:






